## Soldiers of Inkpen who fell in World War 1

### William John Waite 1887-1914

William John Waite was born 19<sup>th</sup> June 1887 in Lower Green, Inkpen to Alfred Waite, an agricultural labourer and Elizabeth Waite (nee Spreadbury). He is recorded in the 1891 and 1901 Census' as living in Inkpen with his family. The 1911 Census shows that he has joined the 2<sup>nd</sup> Battalion Coldstream Guards stationed in Aldershot. Sadly Private no 6236 William Waite was killed in action on 1<sup>st</sup> November 1914 in the Western European Theatre of War at Ypres, Belgium, aged 27. He is listed with the fallen of the Coldstream Guards on the Menin Gate Memorial.





"Capt. Vernon was a most popular officer, and a born leader of men, both in action and in sport, and his loss will be much felt by all classes," and Major Best, Adjutant 5th Royal Inniskilling Fusiliers: "Capt. Vernon was the best companion on service one could possibly have; brave to a fault, and absolutely untiring, he is an officer who could least be spared in the battalion." C.S.M. Newster also wrote: "Capt. Vernon was my Company Officer right from the time I went to B Coy. in Nov. 1914. . . . He was a strict disciplinarian, but we all adored him, and would have done anything for him. Capt. Charles Vernon was a man and a fine soldier, and his old company (what is left of it) will never forget him." There are many letters of the same sort too numerous to mention. Capt. Vernon, although severely wounded, came out from under cover to rescue his servant, and was killed in the attempt. Capt. Vernon was mentioned in Despatches [London Gazette, 5 May, 1916] by General Sir Ian Hamilton, for gallant and distinguished service in the field. He was a good all-round sportsman; champion boxer at Wellington and Woolwich; a keen footballer and cricketer, and a well-known skater and hockey player at Prince's Club; *unm.*

**VERNON, HERBERT DOUGLAS**, Lieut., 3rd Battn. Grenadier Guards, 2nd s. of John Herbert Vernon, of Eastham House, Eastham, co. Chester, by his wife, Elizabeth, dau. of John Bagnall, of Tean Leys, co. Stafford; and gdson. of Sir William Vernon, of Shotwick Park, co. Chester. Bart.; b. Waterloo, near Liverpool, 4 Jan. 1893; educ. Mostyn House, Parkgate, 1901-7; Charterhouse, 1907-12, and Magdalen College, Oxford, 1912-14; was a member of the Charterhouse first football team, and gained his "Blue" as a Freshman at Oxford, playing against Cambridge in 1913 and 1914. At Charterhouse he was also a member of the Cricket Second XI.; at Oxford joined the O.T.C.; gazetted 2nd Lieut. 7th (T.F.) Battn. The King's (Liverpool Regt.) 11 Nov. 1914; transferred to the Grenadier Guards in 1915; promoted Lieut. 30 Jan. 1915; went to France with the 3rd Battn. July, 1915, and served at the front continuously until his death; was present at the attack at the Hohenzollern Redoubt, the Battle of Loos, and also

at Laventie and Ypres, and the Battle of the Somme; killed in action in the Guards' charge between Ghinchy and Les Boeufs, in the Battle of the Somme, 15 Sept. 1916. At the time of his death was serving with the Machine Gun Coy. of the 2nd Guards Brigade; *unm.*

**VERYARD, AUGUSTUS WARD**, Private, No. 224, A Coy., 1/4th Battn. Seaforth Highlanders (T.F.), s. of Augustus Veryard, of 3, Midland Road, Leyton, Ship's Carpenter on Transport, by his wife, (—), dan. of J. G. Ward, of Plaistow; b. Upton Park, co. Essex, 1 Feb. 1895; educ. Plaistow Council School, West Ham; was subsequently a Clerk in Somerset House; volunteered for foreign service after the outbreak of war, and joined the Seaforth Highlanders 5 Sept. 1914; went to France 8 Nov.; took part in the Battle of Neuve Chapelle, and died at Festubert 26 May, 1915, from wounds received in action at Aubers Ridge the previous day. Buried at Merville; *unm.*

**VICKERS, WILLIAM H.**, Private, No. 7359, 1st Battn. Royal West Kent Regt.; served with the Expeditionary Force; killed in action 13 Sept. 1914.

**VICKERY, ALBERT E.**, Private, No. 8, 5970, 4th Battn. Middlesex Regt., s. of Charles Vickery, of Hammersmith, W.; served with the Expeditionary Force; died at Rouen 31 Dec. 1914, of pneumonia, contracted while on active service.

**VINCE, ALFRED JAMES, L.-Corpl.**, No. 7842, Royal West Surrey Regt., s. of Henry Vince, of Marylebone, W.; served with the Expeditionary Force; killed in action 14 Sept. 1914.

**VINCENT, MARK HAMILTON**, Capt., 33rd Punjabis, Indian Army, only s. of the late Col. Henry Alexander Vincent, Central India Horse, of Inverdon, Ayr, and his wife, Beatrice, dau. of Lieut.-Col. J. B. Houlson Craufurd, of Craufurdland, co. Ayr; b. Ayr, 4 May, 1884; educ. Moorland House, Heswall; Malvern College, and the Royal Military College, Sandhurst; gazetted 2nd Lieut. King's Liverpool Regt. 18 Nov. 1903, and promoted Lieut. in the Army 18 Feb. 1906, and in the regiment 10 Sept. 1908; transferred to the Indian Army as Double Company Officer, 33rd Punjabis, 4 Nov. following, and became Capt. 18 Nov. 1912; proceeded on active service with his regiment in Oct. 1914, as Machine Gun Officer, being afterwards appointed Brigade Machine Gun Officer in Egypt; took part in the fighting in Egypt, including the repulse of the Turkish attack on the Suez Canal, and during July and Aug. 1915, was Brigade Major, Suez Brigade, and his services were mentioned in Major-General Sir Alexander Wilson's Despatch of 1 Aug. 1915 [London Gazette, 21 June, 1916]; became Double Company Commander in July; went to France with his regiment in Sept.; took part in the Battle of Loos 25 Sept. 1915,

when the Bareilly Brigade (of which the 33rd Punjabis was a unit) captured the German trenches at Fauquissart; was seriously wounded in the lungs by a bullet while gallantly rallying his men against a strong German counter-attack, and died as result of his wound on 1 Oct. 1915. Buried Merville, France. His Commanding Officer wrote: "The very high opinion I had of your son and the great esteem and affection he was held in by everybody. . . . He was an untiring worker, and most unselfish and self-denying. . . . Above all, he was a perfect gentleman in the very best meaning of the word," and others: "I commanded his regiment for nearly a year and saw much of him. I know what a splendid officer he was and how conscientious and hard-working. A thorough gentleman in every sense of the word and a very gallant soldier. His loss will be very much felt in the regiment." "I personally only saw him for a few minutes during the action, when he was behaving with the greatest gallantry—as all of us who knew him expected he would. . . . I cannot tell you how grieved we all are. . . . He was respected and loved by everyone in the regiment. I would like you to know he will be very sorely missed, and that we all admired and loved him." "A finer and more loyal character I have never met. His devotion to duty was almost a by-word in the regiment. . . . He died as he had always lived—a very gallant gentleman." *Unm.*

**VINCENT, OSWALD**, Private, No. 10096, 2nd Battn. Royal Sussex Regt.; served with the Expeditionary Force; died of wounds at Netley 23 Oct. 1914.

**VINEY, EDWARD HENRY**, Private, No. 10884, Royal West Surrey Regt., s. of W. C. Viney, of Camberwell, S.E.; served with the Expeditionary Force; killed in action 14 Dec. 1914.

**VINSON, ALEXANDER**, Private, No. G. 10260, 3rd Battn. Middlesex Regt.; served with the Expeditionary Force in France; killed in action 30 Sept. 1915; *m.*

**VINSON, JOHN R.**, Private, No. 8/7520, 4th Battn. Middlesex Regt.; served with the Expeditionary Force; died at Rouen 21 Dec. 1914, of bronchitis, contracted while on active service; *m.*

**VIOLIN, FRANCIS**, Private, No. G/7706, 11th Battn. Royal Fusiliers; served with the Expeditionary Force in France; killed in action 8 Nov. 1915.

**VIRGO, JAMES**, Private, No. 6541, Royal West Surrey Regt.; served with the Expeditionary Force; killed in action 9 Jan. 1915.

**VIRTUE, WILLIAM EDWARD**, Private, No. 10/2014, Wellington Infantry Battn. New Zealand Expeditionary Force, 2nd s. of Frederick William Virtue, Master Tailor, by his wife, Katherine, dau. of the late Edward Williams; b. Edinburgh, 4 Jan. 1886; educ. Warrender Park Public Board School; was a Tailor; served in the Yorkshire Territorials for three years; went to Australia in Nov. 1910, where for some time he was associated with the Australian Signallers; proceeded to New Zealand in Feb. 1914; volunteered for Imperial Service, and joined the Wellington Infantry Battn. in Nov. 1914; served in Egypt; also with the Expeditionary Force in Gallipoli from 8 June, 1915, and was killed in action at Suvla Bay 8 Aug. following. He was a well-known swimmer and cross-country runner, and while in Huddersfield (Yorks) and Adelaide, South Australia, won many prizes; *unm.*

**VIVASH, HARRY A.**, Private, No. 8749, 2nd Battn. Royal Sussex Regt.; served with the Expeditionary Force; killed in action at Ypres 4 Nov. 1914.

**VOIGTS, HENRY JAMES**, Private, No. 1665, 1/6th Battn. The Essex Regt. (T.F.), 3rd s. of John Frederick Voigts, of 188, Grove Green Road, Leytonstone, Furniers' Cutter, by his wife, Edith Margaretta, dau. of John Halpin; b. Leytonstone, co. Essex, 7 Dec. 1894; educ. Goodhall Road and Newport Road Schools there; was subsequently apprenticed as a Brass Turner and Telescope Maker; joined the Essex Territorials in June, 1913; volunteered for foreign service on the outbreak of war in Aug. 1914; served with the Mediterranean Expeditionary Force at the Dardanelles from 8 to 16 Aug. 1915, on which latter date he was killed in action, being shot by a sniper while resting. Buried at the rear of the trenches at Anafarta [Grave No. 118]; *unm.*

**VON, PETER**, Private, No. 7705, 2nd Battn. Royal Scots Fusiliers; served with the Expeditionary Force; died in York Military Hospital 23 Oct. 1914, of wounds received in action; *m.*

**VOYCE, HAROLD EDWARD**, Private, No. 2766, 1st Battn. Coldstream Guards; served with the Expeditionary Force; killed in action at Givenchy 21 Dec. 1914; *m.*

**WADDINGTON, BEN COWPER**, Private, No. 5252, 3rd Battn. Coldstream Guards; served with the Expeditionary Force; killed in action at Villers Cotterets 1 Sept. 1914; *m.*

**WADSWORTH, GEORGE FREDERICK**, Rifleman, No. 770, 2nd Battn. (60th Foot) The King's Royal Rifle Corps, 1st s. of the late George Wadsworth, by his wife, Emily Wadsworth (52, Alexandra Street, Ladywood, Birmingham), dau. of George Newton; b. Birmingham, co. Warwick, 6 May, 1887; educ. Nelson Street Board School there; was a Machine Tool Fitter; enlisted in Sept. 1914, after the outbreak of war; served with the Expeditionary Force in France and Flanders from Sept. 1914, and was killed in action at the Battle of Loos 25 Sept. 1915. Buried to the east of Le Rutoire Farm, Vernelles; *unm.*

**WAGHORN, WILLIAM**, Private, No. 7854, 1st Battn. Royal West Kent Regt.; served with the Expeditionary Force; killed in action 13 Oct. 1914; *m.*

**WAINE, EDWARD**, Private, No. 10379, Royal West Surrey Regt.; served with the Expeditionary Force; reported missing 31 Oct. 1914, and now assumed killed.

**WAITE, ARTHUR EDWIN**, Rifleman, No. 5844, 2nd Battn. The Rifle Brigade (The Prince Consort's Own), eldest s. of Joseph R. Waite, by his wife, Sarah (now wife of Frederick J. Dinmore, of 4, Woolwich Road, Bexley Heath), 2nd dan. of the late W. Fletcher, Cockermouth, co. Cumberland; b. Deptford, London, S.E., 15 May, 1899; educ. C. E. Schools, Bexley Heath, and on leaving there was employed at the Coronet Screw Stopper Works, Bexley Heath, during which time he was a member of the Boys' Brigade, and learnt to shoot at the rifle range; enlisted 7 Feb. 1915; served with the Expeditionary Force in France and Flanders from the following Aug., where he became a First Class Signaller, and was killed in action at Fromelles 9 Feb. 1916. Buried in V.C. Avenue, Fromelles. Second Lieut. M. G. Begg wrote: "Your son was a great favourite with all, and in spite of being so young, stood the life out here splendidly, and was always cheery and never a bit upset. He was killed instantaneously by a shrapnel bullet from a German shell."

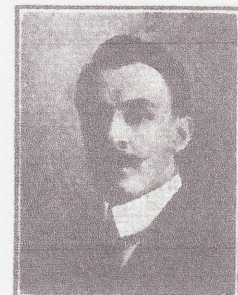

**WAITE, WILLIAM**, Private, No. 6236, 2nd Battn. Coldstream Guards, s. of Alfred Waite, of Inkpen, co. Berks; served with the Expeditionary Force; killed in action at Remic 1 Nov. 1914.

**WAKE, SAMUEL**, Private, No. 8925, 1st Battn. Coldstream Guards; served with the Expeditionary Force; reported missing 29 Oct. 1914, and now assumed killed.

**WAKEFIELD, CHARLES GRESLEY**, Bandsman, No. 9948, 11th (Service) Battn. The Queen's Own (Royal West Kent Regt.), only s. of Charles Thomas Wakefield, Foreman at Messrs. Waterlow & Son, by his wife, Rose; b. Bow, London, E., 9 Sept. 1886; was employed as an Invoice Clerk at Messrs. Nicholson's, St. Paul's Churchyard, London, E.C.; enlisted 3 Sept. 1914, after the outbreak of war; served with the Expeditionary Force in France and Flanders from 2 May, 1915, where he acted as a stretcher-bearer, and was killed in action 5 Oct. following, while carrying a wounded soldier to the Dressing Station. Buried 50 yards east of Baucourt l'Abbaye, four and a half miles north-west of Comblies. He m. at Calton Street Baptist Church, Poplar, Edith (95, Nunhead Lane, Nunhead, S.E.), dau. of John Isaac Hunter, and had a son.
