Description and Reasons for Notification

A steep south and east facing downland slope forming one of the largest remaining fragments of unimproved chalk grassland on the Berkshire Downs in Berkshire.

The grassland is mainly a coarse *Bromus erectus*-dominated sward which is cattle grazed for part of the year. A good range of typical chalk grassland herbs is present including abundant marjoram *Origanum vulgare*, yellow-wort *Blackstonia perfoliata*, purging flax *Linum catharticum*, wild carrot *Daucus carota*, autumn felwort *Gentianella amarella*, clustered bellflower *Campanula glomerata* and chalk milkwort *Polygala calcarea*.

Some of the richest flora occurs on thinner soils on the steepest part of the slope where the turf is shorter and rabbitgrazed, and includes additional species such as horseshoe vetch *Hippocrepis comosa* and kidney vetch *Anthyllis vulneraria*. This part of the site includes a belt of scattered hawthorn *Crataegus monogyna* scrub which provides sheltered warm areas with abundant insect life. This site is particularly important for its butterfly fauna including characteristic chalk downland species such as the chalkhill blue *Lysandra coridon*, marbled white *Melanargia galathea* and the rare adonis blue *Lysandra bellargus* for which this appears to be the last remaining locality in Berkshire.
